Physician Support Services

- *Physician Relations Department* is committed to building trust and collaborating with physicians and their office staff by providing assistance and service in the following areas: practice start-up and marketing, patient referrals, new ventures and partnerships, orientation to hospital services, educational programs, physician recruitment, and communication methods to keep physicians up-to-date with hospital and healthcare environment changes.
- Medical Staff Services is readily available to guide in the application process for medical staff membership and clinical privileges, which requires a minimum of 90 days from time of receipt to completion by Medical Staff Services. In addition, they are here to assist in the medical staff organization and function.
- *CME activities* are provided through high-quality educational programs coordinated by an experienced team.

CINCINNATI NEIGHBORHOODS

The Christ Hospital's central location just north of downtown Cincinnati is convenient and accessible from the more than 200 neighborhoods that exist within the region. No matter what part of town you choose – North, East, West, South, or downtown – Greater Cincinnati offers a wide variety of neighborhoods that are as unique as you. Below is just a sampling of these neighborhoods to give you a quick glimpse into all that Cincinnati has to offer.

Downtown Cincinnati

As the heart of the city, Downtown Cincinnati boasts Fortune 500 companies such as Procter & Gamble, Kroger and Fifth Third; numerous history, arts and entertainment venues; major league sporting facilities; fine and casual dining; fun shopping; and more. The area is also home to numerous holiday celebrations and cultural festivals throughout the year, such as Oktoberfest, Taste of Cincinnati, Cincinnati Reds Opening Day parade, the Flying Pig Marathon, Labor Day Fireworks, and many more. Those who live in downtown Cincinnati enjoy stylish living accommodations such as apartments, lofts, condos and more. Riverfront residents enjoy breathtaking views of the Ohio River and Northern Kentucky skyline.

North

Young families are attracted to Cincinnati's fast-growing northern suburbs for their high caliber schools and diverse housing options. Neighborhoods like West Chester and City of Mason boast newer subdivisions and upscale entertainment and recreation – making them ideal locations for families. Other neighborhoods like Wyoming and Glendale include beautiful historic homes, tree-lined streets, and new construction, offering many options for families.

West

Cincinnati's "West Side" includes tight-knit communities, older homes with a wealth of character, as well as newer housing developments. Neighborhoods such as Northside draw musicians, artists and other creative types who enjoy vintage shops and cool bars. Traditional west side neighborhoods such as Price Hill, Cheviot, Westwood and Delhi include houses and condos of all ages and styles, and are just a short commute to downtown Cincinnati.



East

Many Cincinnatians enjoy the "East Side" luxury condos and townhomes that are right along the Ohio River. Just north of the river, Mt. Lookout and Hyde Park offer historic homes and apartments with both single professionals and families, while farther east, Mariemont and Terrace Park attract families with school-age children and picture-perfect homes. One of the most exclusive areas of Cincinnati is Indian Hill, which includes historic and newer mansions, and Anderson Township offers country clubs, golf courses, and plenty of green space.

South

Across the Ohio River, Northern Kentucky offers numerous neighborhoods that are accessible and convenient to downtown Cincinnati. Those closest to the river, such as Newport and Covington, offer new condo developments, plenty of dining and entertainment, as well as historic, charming homes. A little farther south, areas such as Ft. Mitchell, Florence, Villa Hills, Edgewood and Erlanger offer great schools, tree-lined streets, a variety of shopping and dining options, and new construction.

Cincinnati is home to a number of national attractions, acclaimed museums and numerous family-fun venues, such as:

- *Cincinnati Art Museum* Located in Eden Park, this museum features more than 60,000 works of art, plus national and international traveling exhibits, and a wide range of art-related activities for families. Admission is free.
- *Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal* Included in this historic building are the Museum of Natural History and Science, the Cincinnati History Museum, the Duke Energy Children's Museum, the Omnimax theater, and a number of traveling exhibits throughout the year.
- *Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame and Museum* Just west of Great American Ballpark in downtown Cincinnati, this museum offers Reds fans a visual history the sport's past
- *Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Gardens* This "must see" Cincinnati destination is consistently ranked as one of the top zoos in the country. Opened in 1875, it is the nation's second oldest zoo and a national historic landmark. The Zoo's 75 acres house more than 580 animal species and 3,000 plant varieties.
- **Coney Island** This amusement park along the Ohio River is home to Sunlite Pool, classic rides, seasonal events and live concerts at Riverbend Music Center.
- *Kings Island* This amusement park includes more than 80 rides, including 14 thrill rollercoasters, Planet Snoopy for smaller children, shows, attractions and seasonal events.
- *Krohn Conservatory* Located in Eden Park, this is one of the country's largest public greenhouses and includes 5,000 varieties of exotic tropical, desert and orchid plants.
- *Major League Sports* Cincinnati is home to two major league sports teams the Cincinnati Bengals and the Cincinnati Reds, both of which play right on the Ohio riverfront.
- *National Underground Freedom Center* Located on downtown Cincinnati's riverfront, the area's newest museum demonstrates the importance of the struggles for freedom around the world and throughout history.
- *Newport Aquarium* Located just two minutes from downtown Cincinnati at Newport on the Levee, this aquarium showcases thousands of animals from around the world in a million gallons of water. Families enjoy fun and interactive activities, like touching a shark or meeting a penguin.
- *Newport on the Levee* This entertainment destination located right on the Ohio River includes a number of dining options, shopping, movies, clubs and entertainment.
- *Parks* There is no shortage of beautiful, fun-filled parks throughout the region from Eden Park just north of downtown Cincinnati, to Miami Whitewater in the west, to Sharon Woods up north, to Devou Park in Northern Kentucky.
- *Ride the Ducks* This fun Cincinnati sightseeing tour begins in Newport, Kentucky. You'll see the sights of Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky on land and on water!
- *Riverboat Cruises* Experience the Ohio River up close and personal with a lunch or dinner cruise.
